Making Connections: Inclusivity, Diverse Abilities, and Indigenous Cultural Safety in Early Years

Len Pierre is Coast Salish from Katzie First Nation. Len is an professor, consultant, TEDx Speaker, social activist, change agent, & traditional knowledge keeper. He has a Masters degree in Education from Simon Fraser University focusing on Indigenous curriculum and instructional design. His experience includes Indigenous education and program leadership from various organizations across colonial Canada. He specializes in the development of educational programs and services with decolonization and reconciliation as its core values.

Autism and Neurodiversity in the Early Child Care Setting

Enjoy a presentation on autism and neurodiversity in the early child care setting. This presentation will focus on, understanding autism in the early years, talking with families about their child's development and strategies to support active engagement and communication.

Dr. Karen Bopp

Dr. Karen Bopp has worked extensively with autistic and neurodivergent individuals and their families for over 28 years. She received her Master's in Speech-Language Pathology in 1995 and PhD in Special Education in 2006. Karen is currently the Director of Provincial Outreach at the Centre for Interdisciplinary Research and Collaboration in Autism (CIRCA) at UBC. She is leading the creation of free, on-line, self-paced professional development programs that teach how to better support neurodivergent and autistic individuals in employment, dentistry, family medicine and childcare.

10 Ways to De-Escalate BIG Behaviours and Helping Children Restitute and Repair

Kids who need love and support the most are often the hardest to give it to. It can be scary when children and youth have behaviours that are big and out of control. How do we best support these kids? Angela shares 10 ways to de-escalate big behaviours. She will also discuss on how to support a child or youth AFTER they have "flipped their lid". Angela helps adults guide children into self-restitution via an easy to use 4-step framework.

Based off of William Glasser's 5 basic needs:

Safety, Love, Power, Freedom and Fun!

Angela brings expansive knowledge from her work over the past 12 years in Indigenous communities, and the past 5 years working from a trauma informed lens.

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
